



Traumatic Stress and Child Welfare Work: Walking Where Angels Fear to Tread (Psychosocial Stress Series)

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This book on child welfare workers and secondary traumatic stress is the first and only examination of this prevalent and problematic - though often overlooked -phenomenon. Walking Where Angels Fear to Tread argues that STS is a condition distinct from "burnout" and a factor to be considered in the staggering statistics on the retention of child welfare workers nationwide. The authors seek to bring recognition to this population of caregivers who, like doctors, counselors, and other healing professionals, also confront the issues associated with caring for traumatized people.

The book presents several years worth of research and includes data collected from child welfare workers in five states. The authors identify ways to manage and cope with the stressful nature of this work, and they demonstrate how a culture of quality supervision, proactive management, social support, and leadership can help to reduce the effects of STS. The book also addresses ethics, policy, and legal issues.



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
